This Day, That Year



Editor's note: This year marks the 70th anniversary of the founding of New China.

On Sept 25, 1982, the Chinese women's volleyball team won the World Championship in Lima, Peru, as seen in this item from China Daily.

The team won five world titles in a row in the 1980s, inspiring the nation so much that the "spirit of the women's volleyball team" has since become a phrase in Chinese.

It also won the 1981 World Cup and claimed gold at the Olympics in Los Angeles in 1984

The Chinese players struck Olympic gold again at the 2004 Athens

Games by overcoming Russia.

At the 2016 Rio Olympics, China won the title for the third time, defeating Serbia 3-1 in the final, after defeating champions Brazil in the quarterfinal.

It also won silver at the Atlanta 1996 Games and bronze at the Seoul 1988 and Beijing 2008 Games. The team has netted four World

Cup victories and two World Champi-

In the latest world rankings for women's volleyball, China was in second place behind Serbia.

On Monday, China thrashed the United States in straight sets 25-16, 25-17, 25-22 in the ongoing Women's Volleyball World Cup to snatch their seventh victory in a row.

On Tuesday, Team China breezed to their eighth straight victory, dismantling Kenya 3-0 (25-12, 25-12, 25-14).

The women's national teams of Bra-

zil, China, Italy Russia, Serbia and the United States won their respective pools in the Tokyo Volleyball Qualification Tournament for the Tokyo Olympic Games

next year. "Winning the Olympic ticket is our first step," said Team China coach Lang Ping.

Lang also led the US women's national team to the silver $\,$ medal at the 2008 Beijing Olympics.

Since its birth, the ballet has been highly acclaimed for its moving and tragic plot, magnificent stage design and graceful choreography. Its music undoubtedly, also contributes a lot to the ballet's success and popularity. It is said that The Red Detachment of Women was a prelude to the exertions of Chinese ballet artists trying to establish a Chinese identity using an essentially foreign art form. The piece has been hailed as a model of the successful combination of Western ballet technique with Chinese folk dancing.

Enda Walsh's play *Misterman*, written for a solo performer, is a study of one man's descent into religious mania in small-town Ireland.

The play's action is set in "an abandoned depot and dilapidated factory" in Inishfree, where Ioner Thomas Magill lives out his days, interacting with the people of the town via taperecordings he has made of their voices, or by impersonating them himself. Magill is a fierce evangelist, disgusted by the ungodliness of the townspeople. He knows that jovial Dwain Flynn is a miserable drunk, that Timmy O'Leary enslaves his lovely mother, and that sweet Mrs Cleary is a blasphemous flirt. He is convinced that it's up to him to save the sinful place, but his deranged mental state leads to dire consequences for him and the town.

Eight Immortals Crossing China Puppet Art Theater

The Child Dreams is a 2010 opera by Gil Shohat, based on the play of the same name by Hanoch Levin

On May 13, 1939, following the bloody events of Kristallnacht (Night of the Broken Glass), a ship called St. Louis departed from Hamburg carrying 936 Jewish refugees headed for Cuba

But upon reaching Cuban territorial waters, immigration authorities refused to accept them. The ship then began sailing from harbor to harbor in a desperate attempt to find a country which would agree to let the passengers in. The story of that ship, which was also the basis for the movie Voyage of the Damned, partly inspired Levin to write his play The Child Dreams.

It is an escape journey to a distant land, to the unknown, a flight from a past of terror to a future of consolation. Levin's talent of interweaving satirical and comic situations with very expressive poetic ones, leads to a sensual and emotional experience, soberly dealing with the essence of human existence.

Artificial light at night linked to weight gain

Sleeping with a cellphone, bright alarm clock on or a television next to your bed puts women at risk of weight gain, a study found. Women who slept with a light or even with the TV on were 17 percent more likely to have gained 5 kilograms over the course of five years, according to the study. Light coming in from outside the room was associated with more modest weight gain, researchers found. The study is the first to find an association between exposure to artificial light at night while sleeping and weight gain in women, according to the National Institutes of Health in the United States

Say goodbye to Singapore's iconic statue

One Faber Group, the operator of amuse ment attractions in Singapore, announced that the Sentosa Merlion's last day of operations will be on Oct 20. It will make way for the Sentosa Sensoryscape project, which includes a themed thoroughfare linking Sentosa's north and south shores. To encourage Singaporeans to revel in nostalgia at the 37-meter-tall landmark, One Faber has offered tickets at half-price to residents and permanent residents.

Video: Frenchman sees changes in Yantai

As the People's Republic of China prepares to celebrate its 70th anniversary on Oct 1, our website is featuring a series of videos. In the latest episode, we interviewed Frenchman Michel Humbert, 84, Having retired in 2000, he gladly accepted an invitation from Shandong province to become a senior adviser at Yantai city's investment development board, which he regards not only as a good opportunity but also his "destiny". He expressed great confidence about the future of the country.

Society: License for tests of auto vehicles

Wuhan, Hubei province, has issued the country's first commercial licenses to companies for trials of driverless vehicles in open road conditions. The companies — including Baidu, Haylion Technologies and Deep-Blue Technology — received licenses from the Wuhan traffic authority and will be able to conduct trials in designated areas of a 28-kilometer road.

The area is a demonstration zone set up by the city for the testing of internet-connected cars. The area has attracted more than 40 automakers from home and abroad to set up operations to test their buses taxis, logistics trucks and sanitation vehicles. Officials said that commercial licensing will allow companies, based on previous tests, to deepen their trials of remote driving and the application of the intelligent collaborative systems under the 5G environment.



Travel: Austria makes trips easier for visitors

The Austrian region of Tirol is making travel to its attractions easier for Chinese tourists by allowing them to pay via Alipay and WeChat from next summer, according to the Austrian National Tourist Office. The plan will cover attractions in Inns-

bruck, Kitzbuehel, Kufstein, Soelden and St. Anton. Chinese travelers made nearly 1 million visits to Austria last year, and the number who stay overnight keeps growing. June to August is the most popular time among Chinese tourists, accounting for 67 percent. Tirol, in the heart of the Alps, is a land of mountains, home to more than 500 summits over 3,000 meters.

World: Bird-singing competition held

Over 1,800 birds from Thailand, Malaysia and Singapore took part in the annual bird-singing competition in Thailand's southern province of Narathiwat on Sunday, In Southeast Asia, especially in Thailand, Malaysia and Singapore, and also in Vietnam and Laos, it is common to hold regular bird-singing competitions. The competition takes place on open areas where a metal framework is set up for the small wooden bird cages to hang off.
